Dear City Council,

Thank you for listening as we addressed you again last night! I tried to send this yesterday night, but it seemed like it bounced back. I believe that was caused by the video attached with public comments from people experiencing homelessness in our community. Here is the link to that video instead: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=n88N0lqdjMM Third time is a charm. I have now converted the presentation into a pdf because the email bounced back with just the powerpoint.

I am deeply troubled by the lack public process leading up to today's budget session. The fact that the policing increase was brought as a part of the base budget and cut the the public completely out of this process. The public has repeatedly showed up at the budget work sessions (where it was not discussed until today when it was already in the budget) and committee meetings (Public Safety and CPAC) to talk about this proposed budget increase and for the last month the Chief of Police has been absent.

I will note that though communities of color and people who are experiencing homelessness cry out against overpolicing that these cries fall on deaf ears. We have statistics from the NAACP Criminal Justice Work Group on racial disparities in local policing, and we have statistics from our work at BeLoved about the high number of arrests and citations for possibly homeless people in Asheville.. And we have increased the budget for policing without considering the root causes of crime and systems that criminalize people into mass incarceration, further homelessness and joblessness.

And the numbers the Chief presented:

20 vacant positions but saying this increase will save money in overtime when logically if we filled those 20 positions we would cut overtime costs.

Shouldn't we focus on filling those positions first before asking for 15 more?

The folks in the video are part of our Homeless Voice project at BeLoved Asheville. Homeless Voice meets weekly and works to have people who are homeless amplify their voices in public policy decisions affecting their lives and to equip the group to create their own projects to benefit the homeless community.

Hello,

I was unable to make it to the Public Safety Committee Meeting today; however, I would like to make it clear that I am in opposition to the \$1 million that Chief Hooper has requested on an annual basis for APD to double the downtown unit.

I have worked in a couple different fields that have brought me into regular contact with law enforcement. I have come to realize through this work, that I no longer want to talk about individual police officers or isolated events. I feel that we need to move past good cop/bad cop conversation: the "good" cop that attends the community BBQ and does the electric slide with all the kids and "bad" cop that arrested, violated or killed one of those same community members. I want to talk about policing as a whole.

We have seen time and time again that increased policing leads to increased arrest, conviction, sentencing and deportation. It does not end crime, nor does it end poverty. In fact, it further criminalizes poverty and keeps people in poverty (think re-entry). If crime connected to poverty is the concern (statistics?), I would ask you to consider whether or not policing adds to or detracts from the stress of poverty and how stress contributes to "crimes" -- drug use, stealing, violence, etc. What does it mean to consistently experience and observe state condoned surveillance, power and violence? What does it mean to have families torn apart? What does it mean to grow up knowing that your community has been targeted due to income, race, ethnicity, language, immigrant status, gender identity or sexual orientation? What does it mean to grow up knowing that you are not legally allowed to be you? What does it mean when you call the police and do not feel any safer after that interaction?

People have learned over time that they actually have to protect themselves from law enforcement most of the time. Law enforcement is all too often violating community members. This can happen by way of mere presence, intimidation, surveillance, harassment, policies increasing the scope of crime, over reaction to low level crimes, lack of action in actual times of crisis (think DV w/o physical marks), arrest, incarceration, deportation and so on. When people truly care about each other, they avoid the involvement of law enforcement at all costs; this often holds true even if they are being hurt by someone that they care for or have an attachment to. For example, statistics show that 1 in 3 victims of domestic violence feel *less* safe after calling for LE support; 1 in 2 feel the same as prior to the call; 1 in 5 feel more safe. That means 70% of DV victims that call LE for help feel the same or less safe after involving LE. Only 20% feel any safer (http://www.cdar.uky.edu/CoerciveControl/docs/law-enforcement-draft6%209-28-15.pdf).

These lessons I have learned merely by engaging in my (Asheville) community led me to these beliefs, triggered my interest in the research that is out there and shaped my community-oriented values. Communities will be safer when we choose to invest in the people by helping to meet their basic needs: housing, public transportation, high quality schools, community centers, mental health, support for drug users, restorative justice programming, re-entry programming, safe spaces for women and LGBT+ people. People avoid calling the police when they can and when they do call, it often does not help them feel more safe.

Thank you for listening. I hope that you consider spending one million dollars on the people rather than the people policing them.

Mayor and City Council:

The Asheville Downtown Association's Board of Directors supports the Asheville Police Department's request to add officers to its Downtown Unit. We support 24-hour/7-day coverage of the central business district (CBD) by the downtown unit, rather than by patrol and augment officers.

This request proactively considers the projected growth of downtown and the time it will take to hire and train new officers. Each day, downtown's population increases as residents come in to the city center for work. Our residential population is growing too and will likely double in upcoming years. Data shows the current number of residential units for the central business district at 997, with an additional ~700 units planned. Add to this nearly 600 new hotel rooms and an additional 80,000sqft+ of office space in the Central Business District and the daily population growth of downtown becomes even more significant.

The Chief's request also proposes extending the boundaries of the Downtown Unit to include not only the Central Business District and South Slope, but also the River Arts District and South French Broad area. Calls for service in these combined areas are comparable to that of the department's current districts.

In the current downtown (CBD) area, car B&E's have increased substantially rising from 137 in 2015 to 173 in 2016. The South Slope area has seen a similar rise in car B&E's, specifically with unlocked vehicles. Aggravated assaults have increased from 47 in 2015 to 56 in 2016. Domestic and non-domestic aggravated assaults have increased in the South French Broad area and rapes have doubled. In 2016, there were seven rapes reported within the *proposed* Downtown District, spanning from downtown to the South French Broad area and in the River Arts District. Burglaries have risen in the River Arts District (RAD) over the past two years, particularly business burglaries increasing from two incidents in 2015 to 12 in 2016. Vehicles stolen from RAD have doubled over that same time period. *Statistics provided by Asheville Police Department*.

The Downtown Unit is a specialized community-policing unit and officers are better prepared to address the unique issues that arise in downtown, often providing social services and resource information. And because they are familiar with those who frequent downtown, they're better able to address needs and provide access to necessary assistance programs. Downtown Unit officers annually conduct more than 1,000 hours of community outreach in the form of community events, meetings with mental health/substance abuse resource providers,

jail/hospital diversion teams, etc. Officers are certified in crisis intervention and have developed close relationships with homeless service providers to help maintain safe spaces for those in need.

Our recent Issues Survey ranked safety as a top need for the vitality of downtown. In order to maintain a safe downtown we must plan for future needs now. We acknowledge that respondents ranked "more police" low when asked how they would assign resources. There is no doubt we have critical needs in our community; however, ensuring appropriate public safety for all residents and visitors to downtown must top that list of needs. We agree that parking/transportation options, infrastructure improvements, increased affordable/workforce housing and addressing homelessness in our community should also be top priorities, but don't believe that funding should be considered an "either-or" option. Also to note, our survey was completed in 2016 prior to the release of annual crime statistics.

Through partnerships and collaboration, we hope that Council members can find a compromise in budgeting that will prioritize safety, infrastructure, housing and social service programs to address downtown's most pressing challenges.

Good afternoon! Attached please find two spreadsheets that adhere to your 1/19 request for information. The first spreadsheet contains all Part A crimes – murder, sex offenses, burglary, aggravated assault - for each of the ten public housing communities. The second spreadsheet includes all Part C arrests (liquor, drugs, weapons) for the ten public housing communities. These lists include all offenses that used the address of the public housing community as the reporting address. If another address was used as the reporting address it would not be captured in this list despite the fact that it occurred within a public housing community. Your email requested information for 2011-2015, but we included 2016 as well. Both spreadsheets are organized by offense and include the case number (incident number), offense, location and the date the incident occurred. If there is a publically available report you will able to find this utilizing the Police to Citizen tool on our website (please note: rape, statutory rape, incest and sex offenses are excluded from P2C and public crime mapping, so even if an incident report exists for those crimes, it will not be available via P2C).

Below please find information that adheres to request #E. The second chart does not break down these calls by type of call, rather combines them. We do not have any records responsive to your request for information on "person with a dangerous weapon (not a gun) and persons with weapons wounds not sustained by a gun."

Good afternoon! Attached please find two spreadsheets that adhere to your 1/19 request for information. The first spreadsheet contains all Part A crimes — murder, sex offenses, burglary, aggravated assault - for each of the ten public housing communities. The second spreadsheet includes all Part C arrests (liquor, drugs, weapons) for the ten public housing communities. These lists include all offenses that used the address of the public housing community as the reporting address. If another address was used as the reporting address it would not be captured in this list despite the fact that it occurred within a public housing community. Your email requested information for 2011-2015, but we included 2016 as well. Both spreadsheets are organized by offense and include the case number (incident number), offense, location and the date the incident occurred. If there is a publically available report you will able to find this utilizing the Police to Citizen tool on our website (please note: rape, statutory rape, incest and sex offenses are excluded from P2C and public crime mapping, so even if an incident report exists for those crimes, it will not be available via P2C).

Below please find information that adheres to request #E. The second chart does not break down these calls by type of call, rather combines them. We do not have any records responsive to your request for information on "person with a dangerous weapon (not a gun) and persons with weapons wounds not sustained by a gun."


