The Sylva town board voted last Thursday to further investigate a satellite annexation request by a county resident. Aaron Littlefield, who lives off Dillardtown Road on the northeast side of the town, filed a petition for voluntary satellite annexation by the town. ## Hi Everyone,

I hope you are having a great week. I have jury duty this week, but I have not had to report yet. Hopefully, I will be at the meeting on Thursday, but I won't know for sure until Wednesday at 5:00 p.m.

#### Agenda Items:

- Ed Harwood from the American Legion is going to present a plaque to the Town Board for your help with improvements to the American Legion building
- I've attached parade resolutions separately from the agenda. There are a couple of minor changes. The biggest change from the parade routes last year is we are going back to the previous Christmas Parade route. The parade will begin at the Fire Department and end at Mark Watson Park. There isn't enough room to stage the floats and start the parade at Mark Watson Park.
- Satellite Annexation: The certification of sufficiency is included in the agenda packet. This essentially means that Amanda has researched the request and the Town Board has the authority to consider the request to be annexed. Adopting this does not mean that the board approves the request. It only means the request is valid because the property is close enough to city limits, the town could provide services, and the total satellite annexations would not exceed 10% of the town's area. The resolution in the agenda packet sets the date of the public hearing when the Town Board can vote on the request. Sept. 12 at 5:30 p.m. gives us enough time to advertise for the public hearing.   - Prior Info: Mr. Littlefield's request seems simple, but this is very complicated and cumbersome for one parcel. Researching this request is a tremendous amount of work for Amanda. Approving this petition to annex the property would be shortsighted. This request doesn't consider everything that would need to be updated like the zoning map, tax records/city code, Powell Bill map, and the boundary and annexation survey with the census. The cost and time to update all of this for one parcel is not economical. This is why the request is so unusual. It would make sense for an entire street, neighborhood, or community. If the Town annexed this parcel, we couldn't charge taxes until the 2020 bills based on the timing of the request that we received and the tax laws. The precedent this would set brings up many other "what if' scenarios that we need to think about. I think the Board should adopt the Certificate of Sufficiency and schedule a public hearing, but ultimately, this request for annexation should be denied. The cost of the services the Town would have to provide will outweigh his annual taxes. The work involved for staff to research this is very costly for one parcel.

Volunteering for higher taxes doesn't happen every day, but Aaron Littlefield is making a case for it.

Littlefield filed a petition for voluntary satellite annexation by Sylva, and at their meeting last Thursday, the board voted unanimously to authorize the town clerk, Amanda **Murajda**, to look into the petition.

For Littlefield, it's all about representation, he said.

"It pains me to say this, but my wife and I are willing to pay over \$1,000 a year in taxes just to have the right to vote in a local election," he said. "It's almost like a poll tax for us to be able to have a say in the local proceedings."

Littlefield lives at 5 Hilltop Dr., off Dillardtown Road on the northeast side of Sylva. His house is is "across the street and three lots down" from town limits, he said.

"The First Amendment right to petition officials is very important," the high school civil rights teacher told the board. "I'd like to be a qualified voter at the time of the election. I've lived in Jackson County all my adult life, but like 93 percent of county residents, I have never been blessed to vote in a town election."

Even though the property is not contiguous with city limits, satellite annexation can be requested, Sylva Mayor Lynda Sossamon said.

"Statutes state ways that we can annex property, including property that is not contiguous to our current town limits, so that is what the petition will allow Amanda to look up," she said.

Town Manager Paige Dowling said Littlefield's request was "absolutely unprecedented."

"We've had satellite annexation requests in the past, but it was most likely for a business that wanted to sell alcohol," she said, referring to a time when alcohol could be sold in town limits but not in the county.

Voters approved county-wide alcohol sales in 2012.

Dowling cited a gas station on U.S. 74 that petitioned for annexation so it could sell beer and wine, and the CVS store on N.C. 107 that applied for the same reason.

"Amanda certifies the request," Dowling said. "She goes through the statute, looking at how close he is to the town, all the past satellite annexations. Then a public hearing is scheduled."

If the annexation is approved, Littlefield would qualify for every other service town residents receive, such as police and garbage service, Dowling said.

"It's not a town street, so no town snow removal," she said.

Littlefield joining Sylva would not affect his neighbors.

"Generally, you would be **hearing this request** for an entire neighborhood or a street," Dowling said.
"So it's more complicated than it appears." **"Since this request is unprecedented it has taken quite a bit of staff time to research everything that's involved."** 

Usually, annexation is for residents who live next to town limits, she said.

There's more to the request than simply taking Littlefield's tax money and sending garbage trucks and police cruisers by the house.

"If approved, it would mean redoing every single map," Dowling said.

Sylva **T**own Clerk Amanda **Murajda** forwarded a list of most of the things involved if Littlefield's request for satellite annexation is approved.

The town would need to:

Update boundary survey with the Census Bureau.

Update the zoning map.

Apply the zoning district.

Update the map with the Register of Deeds.

File an ordinance with the Register of Deeds. Update the map with the Board of Elections. Update the map with Secretary of State. Update the ordinance with Secretary of State. #### Commissioner Nestler:

It was a pleasure speaking with you at the last board meeting. Thank you for listening to my concerns and encouraging me to reach out to you if I experienced any difficulties.

I wanted to follow up to see if there had been any discussions regarding the state of my petition. I have attached a guide supplied by the NC League of Municipalities (90 pages) that details changes following the 2011 law and the process for annexation. The pages relevant to the current mechanism that I am pursuing are found in Chapter 3 (Beginning with pages 34- 47 with all relevant draft ordinances contained there-in).

I am inquiring as to if the city clerk has been caused to investigate the petition and to certify its validity in accordance with state law. If this has not yet been done, when shall it be done?

If this has been done, in accordance with law, when will a date be fixed?

Under the mechanism that I am pursuing, there is no requirement that the city accept my petition for annexation, but I am entitled to a timely and public hearing. My wife and I greatly look forward to contributing back for the sewage services that we already receive, as well as municipal trash service that we would like to receive. We also greatly look foreward to taking part as qualified voters in the 2019 election, and as such respectfully request, without delay the continuance of this process in formalizing our citizenship of Sylva, NC.

PS: The pertinent statute is NCGS § 160A-58.1. Petition for annexation; standards.

Specifically, I would like to direct your attention to NCGS§ 160A-58.2. Public hearing.

Upon receipt of a petition for annexation under this Part, the city council **shall cause** the city clerk to investigate the petition, and to certify the results of his investigation. If the clerk certifies that upon investigation the petition appears to be valid, the council **shall fix** a date for a public hearing on the annexation. Notice of the hearing shall be published once at least 10 days before the date of hearing.

At the hearing, any person residing in or owning property in the area proposed for annexation and any resident of the annexing city may appear and be heard on the questions of the sufficiency of the petition and the desirability of the annexation. If the council then finds and determines that (i) the area described in the petition meets all of the standards set out in G.S. 160A-58.1(b), (ii) the petition bears the signatures of all of the owners of real property within the area proposed for annexation (except those not required to sign by G.S. 160A-58.1(a)), (iii) the petition is otherwise valid, and (iv) the public health, safety and welfare of the inhabitants of the city and of the area proposed for annexation will be best served by the annexation, the **council may adopt** an ordinance annexing the area described in the petition. The ordinance may be made effective immediately or on any specified date within six months from the date of passage. (1973, c. 1173, s. 2.)
