However, I think it would be great to mention that we sent the ICCHP plan out for feedback, received feedback, wanted to address some points of confusion that came up. If we could mentioned the following things—happy for you to modify these notes in your response so we don't misrepresent the differences between the programs.

- What's the difference between back@Home and normal ESG RRH?
 - Back@Home is not inherently different than RRH and prevention work
 - It works to provide statewide coverage for RRH and prevention financial assistance and services
 - It provides statewide efficiencies (e.g., inspections, training, landlord engagement, etc.) and allows for streamlined reporting to show impact.
 - Combines great work done by local agencies into one statewide rehousing system 1 entry point (coordinated with local CE)
 - Organizations already doing RRH should not notice much difference aside from...
- Will back@Home be recruiting one state-wide agency? (No- currently operating RRH programs can and should apply)
- Will Back@Home agencies enter data into the HMIS that my CoC uses? (yes-Back@Home will use BOTH HMIS implementations)
- Are there two separate RFAs?
 - Yes, there is a plan to separate the Back@Home RFA.
 - ESG funds for shelter, street outreach, RRH, prevention and HMIS will still be available in the second RFA to all organizations, including those who receive funding from the first RFA. However, if an organization receives RRH funding through B@H, they won't be eligible in the second RFA as they should be fully funded by the first RFA.

Otherwise, I think you can mention that we are working on getting an RFA ready to go out as soon as possible.

Thanks for raising this up. I've attached the proposal that was sent out for comment last week, my letter to the HUD office and HUD's response. It was great to have the reassurance from HUD to move forward quickly—and we will plan to have one of our assigned HUD TA team, Heather Dillashaw, on our Monday call to answer any overarching questions. It was also helpful to receive feedback from you all and many of the agencies you work with in your communities via email and on Wednesday's call. While most feedback was positive or asked additional questions, some shared valid concerns that we hope to work through in collaboration with the CoCs. Back@Home is meant to be a solution — creating infrastructure, efficiencies and scalability in disaster, while providing additional coverage and capacity where needed. It is not envisioned to hinder CoCs processes or ability to move quickly. Based on feedback, we have been taking another look at the plan and are making some changes to give CoCs flexibility in how they ensure they serve the most people, most efficiently, with the best outcomes possible—including the option to opt out of the Back@Home network if that is the best option for their community. We are working on a tactical document that walks through what that would look like and hope to share before Monday's call.

Yes, HQS and debarment can be added as requirements, but we, ESG, would be cautious to add things that create barriers to housing. HUD takes issue with it.

No, income and "at risk of homelessness" cannot be added as eligibility requirements for RRH. Income cannot be considered for RRH recipients under ESG. RRH recipients must be literally homeless or fleeing domestic violence; they cannot be "at risk."

"we can't have them dictate the funding directly": I think this is a matter of how it is interpreted. As far as we know for HUD/ESG and what they are telling us for ESG-CV is we must have them dictate the funding directly according to the regulation we cited in the last email. At the least, asking for feedback would be a must, but we aren't sure that would fully fulfill the requirement.

If that is the route you want to take we can send out an email to our sub-recipients. It would be something we could do together. I'm not sure that it would fulfill the requirement however. What would we consider a consensus? I would still ask even if we got consensus what would we do with those agencies that did not or would not to buy-in. Also, do we tell them that this is a Balance of State administered program? The BoS is one of 12 CoC's. I know that they represent a number of counties/organizations but they do not represent everyone. Remember, this is not or rather ESG is not, a state-operated program. It is a state administered, 100% HUD funded, federal formula grant program.

I'm sorry that I have to ask so many questions and bring up these issues but when HUD comes to audit both fiscally and programmatically the only one responsible for answering ESG questions are the ESG staff and I.

Thanks for this feedback. Definitely not what was intended by sentence referred to in #6, so I will make that change. I was more referring to not having full statewide coverage, which I will make more clear. I can also better clarify the sentence referred to in #5. Some of the feedback are additional requirements that we used in Back@Home. We can consider taking them away, but there isn't an exclusion for requiring them by ESG, right? I think we wanted to have an HQS inspection, for example, in case the long term stability for the household included a housing voucher, which would require an HQS inspection.

Do you think asking all CoCs to review and provide feedback to the Back@Home-CV plan would meet the requirements of #1 or should I ask that directly either in this letter or to assigned HUD TA? We want to make sure all communities have input, but by virtue of it being a state-operated program, we can't have them dictate the funding directly.

As stated in our response to your proposal we want to bring up a few items that you may want to include or consider in your letter to HUD. Please see them listed here.

- 1. You need to clarify your meaning of a "process not dependent on annual ESG funding process". You may want to specify what you mean by that. As pointed out the in citation here § 576.400 Area-wide systems coordination requirements.
- (a) Consultation with Continuums of Care. The recipient must consult with each Continuum of Care that serves the recipient's jurisdiction in determining how to allocate ESG funds each program year; developing the performance standards for, and evaluating the outcomes of, projects and activities assisted by ESG funds; and developing funding, policies, and procedures for the administration and operation of the HMIS.
- **(b)** *Coordination with other targeted homeless services.* The <u>recipient</u> and its <u>subrecipients</u> must coordinate and integrate, to the maximum extent practicable, ESG-funded activities with other programs targeted to <u>homeless</u> people in the area covered by the <u>Continuum of Care</u> or area over which the services are coordinated to provide a strategic, community-wide system to prevent and end homelessness for that area.

We were not aware that the 12 CoC's we fund have been consulted. This was obviously done without input from the ESG staff.

- 2. Income is not an eligibility requirement for RRH. Individual needs to be literally homeless or fleeing domestic violence. At risk of homelessness is not an eligibility requirement for RRH.
- 3. HQS is not required by ESG. ESG requires minimum habitability standards.
- 4. Debarment checks are not required by ESG.
- 5. We are confused by this sentence, "Operating Back@Home as a statewide rehousing program provides the ability to create, maintain, and streamline systems, allowing Rehousing Agencies to house individuals and families more quickly. Processes that can be handled at the state level are remove some of the burden from Rehousing Agencies."
- 6. "Procuring Rehousing Agencies through a process not dependent on annual ESG funding process would allow us to achieve statewide coverage and ensure that the assistance is implemented consistently." This implies that the current ESG process is inconsistent and does not work. We realize this is not intentional but could send up a red flag. If anything the program could be described as a compliment to what we do now under the circumstances, coordinating with the ESG agency.

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- **(b)** *Coordination with other targeted homeless services.* The <u>recipient</u> and its <u>subrecipients</u> must coordinate and integrate, to the maximum extent practicable, ESG-funded activities with other programs targeted to <u>homeless</u> people in the area covered by the <u>Continuum of Care</u> or area over which the services are coordinated to provide a strategic, community-wide system to prevent and end homelessness for that area.

We were not aware that the 12 CoC's we fund have been consulted. This was obviously done without input from the ESG staff.

- 2. Income is not an eligibility requirement for RRH. Individual needs to be literally homeless or fleeing domestic violence. At risk of homelessness is not an eligibility requirement for RRH.
- 3. HQS is not required by ESG. ESG requires minimum habitability standards.
- 4. Debarment checks are not required by ESG.
- 5. We are confused by this sentence, "Operating Back@Home as a statewide rehousing program provides the ability to create, maintain, and streamline systems, allowing Rehousing Agencies to house individuals and families more quickly. Processes that can be handled at the state level are remove some of the burden from Rehousing Agencies."

6. "Procuring Rehousing Agencies through a process not dependent on annual ESG funding process would allow us to achieve statewide coverage and ensure that the assistance is implemented consistently." This implies that the current ESG process is inconsistent and does not work. We realize this is not intentional but could send up a red flag. If anything the program could be described as a compliment to what we do now under the circumstances, coordinating with the ESG agency.

Good morning,

Below are three published statements by HUD regarding the initial CARES Act funds. The information provided follows the information provided in previous calls and emails regarding the ESG-CV funding. Although they will not put anything further in writing I did have a conversation with the HUD field office again today. On that call I verified my understanding that the initial funds will not be dealt with any differently then a "normal" finding cycle. Another words the same process should be used for ESG-CV. The only caveats that they know of at this point are that the use of funds, i.e. purchases, admin, extended rent assistance etc. may be expanded. Another point raised was that it is clear to them that local communities must be the ones to determine how funds re best spent in their community. There is a dependence on the CoC's to make that determination and then inform us how they would like that money handed along. Of course they continued to remind me that this will come out in a HUD ESG guidance document and that the information provided is based on what they understand prior to the guidance.

You can see that this is related only to the first allocation (which was expected 4/26 but has yet to arrive.) The second amount will most certainly provide more leigh-way for states and it appears a much expanded use.

I hope this helps you and I wanted to send it prior to our call later so you could have a bit more context.

Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG)

The CARES Act provides up to \$4 billion in ESG supplemental funding. Of that \$4 billion, \$2 billion are to be distributed to grantees using the same statutory formula used to distribute the regular, annual FY20 ESG allocations. 

Areas of challenges to the proposal regarding DV victim services include:

Data and reporting – DV agencies required to use HMIS or data gathering methodology defined by NCCDHHS?

Targeting support for underserved victims and communities requires intentional processes for outreach, victim services and monitoring

Proposal references philanthropy as mechanism to avoid reimbursement process for grant recipient agencies. Whatever the mechanism, making funding available up front is key.

Employment is challenging right now and follow up by unemployment agencies to individuals seeking assistance is not readily available.

Housing is not readily available in Eastern NC and other areas of NC still recovering from hurricane Dorian, etc. Filling that gap requires allowing DV agencies to access funding for hotels to house victims.

Hello,

See <u>National Low Income Housing Coalition Report</u> on non-congregate sheltering. They mention CT and NY allowing for non-congregate sheltering for full sheltering populations and mention specifically that NC is vague here (which is true). We asked FEMA for this and were specifically told by FEMA (received their answer today) that they would not cover all people living in congregate settings. Their language:

"This does not include all people who are currently staying in congregate homeless shelters. However, it may include homeless individuals in congregate shelters where remaining in said settings pose a risk to other residents or with at least one member who tested positive for COVID-19, who live in congregate shelters and will require isolation. FEMA will not reimburse for the sheltering of non-symptomatic individuals that are not among the foregoing categories."

Do you have a contact in CT that I could reach out to for more information on the their public health directive that allowed them to get approval for non-congregate sheltering for people living in congregate shelters? We are nervous about being too prescriptive here because we don't want all congregate settings to close—especially as we don't have full county non-congregate sheltering yet.

David—let me know if you have any advice on this from CT, NY or other states you are working with.

We're working on a draft evictions moratorium EO and I would like to include something related to the evictions prevention programming in the document. Would you mind sending any details you have on that program, including an overview of the possible timeline for implementation?

And see below for a brief summary of what we're thinking this EO might include. Thanks!

Proposed EO:

For the duration of the emergency declaration or up until 90 days after the end of the emergency declaration, this executive order would:

- Prohibit landlords from initiating eviction proceedings
- Prohibit eviction orders from being issued by the courts or enforced by local law enforcement
- Prohibit all judicial or non-judicial foreclosure proceedings

Ideally, the moratorium of filings, hearings and enforcements would extend for some period (30-90 days) past the end of the emergency declaration. This would allow more time to get people into the eviction prevention program (with CARES Act and potential other funding sources) that DHHS is planning. This program would allow for funding to go to landlords for rental arrears and rental assistance and avoid a large eviction cliff at the end of the declaration. The order would not relieve an individual of their obligations to pay rent, make mortgage payments, or any other obligations which an individual may have under a tenancy or mortgage.

Hello,

To follow up on this eviction scorecard (where NC is ranked very low) and the eviction discussion overall, I would recommend that we consider a further executive order on eviction prevention, following some other states' leads. The Chief Justice Moratorium only deals with hearings not being held until June 1st to protect the courts and the Justice Center has pointed out that there are some loop holes in this order and have heard that some people are still being evicted (through 2-1-1 and others anecdotally). Ideally, we would have an executive order that stopped landlords from filing for summary ejectment, stopped hearings (which was mostly accomplished under the Chief Justice moratorium), issued a stay of eviction judgements, and kept eviction orders from being enforced. The New Hampshire E.O. (attached) covers all of those areas pretty simply and could be something we follow.

Ideally, the moratorium of filings, hearings and enforcements would extend for some period (30 days) past the end of the emergency declaration. California, for example, has extended their moratorium 90 days after the emergency declaration. I don't think we would need that length of time, but as we are planning an eviction prevention program (with CARES Act and potential other funding sources), this would allow for more time to get people into the program and funding to the landlord for rental arrears and rental assistance, and avoid a large eviction cliff at the end of the declaration. I believe the apartment association would be on board with this if they knew there would be Eviction Prevention programming coming as the best thing for landlords is that the arrears are paid and they don't have to evict clients and find new tenants. From a stewardship perspective is much cheaper to prevent evictions that rapidly rehouse an individual or family.

Basically, is there consideration of a stronger executive order that would stop landlords from filing for summary ejectment, hearings and enforcements at least until the end of the emergency declaration or, potentially, for 30-90 days out? Is there anything I can do with your team or legal to

support these efforts?

I think there needs to be a conversation with AG Stein, Gov. Cooper and Chief Justice Beasley regarding housing and the current crisis we find ourselves in. This includes tenants and

homeowners who may face being put out of their homes because of the inability to meet their financial obligations. I have talked to a representative of the NC Apartment Association and we agreed the interests of Ts & LLs are intertwined here and something will need to be done to protect LLs' ability to stay in business at the same time of keeping families in NC housed and safe.

See below from the Sheriffs Association to its members. Attached is the legal services providers' letter to the Sheriffs we sent last week. And below is a list of counties where we believe sheriffs are not executing orders for possession.

Attached are Governors' Orders Stopping evictions in New Hampshire, Washington State & Indiana and NC's Emergency Powers law – NCGS 166A-19.30.

- 1. The Washington proclamation cites specifically to RCW 43.06.220(1)(h), which reads as follows:
 - (h) Such other activities as he or she reasonably believes should be prohibited to help preserve and maintain life, health, property or the public peace.

 Wash. Rev. Code Ann. § 43.06.220 (West)
- 2. New Hampshire's order does not cite to statutory provision, but their statute has this provision:
 - (e) To perform and exercise such other functions, powers, and duties as are necessary to promote and secure the safety and protection of the civilian population. N.H. Rev. Stat. Ann. § 4:45

Here is North Carolina's similar provision:

§ 166A-19.30. (b)(5) "To perform and exercise such other functions, powers, and duties as are necessary to promote and secure the safety and protection of the civilian population."

Subject: G.S. 42-36.2 - Execution on Writ for Possession of Property --- Impact of the Coronavirus

Pandemic

To: All Sheriffs

The Issue

G.S. § 42-36.2(a), regarding execution on a Writ for Possession of Property, provides that the sheriff **shall** execute the writ "no more than five days from the sheriff's receipt thereof" (emphasis added).

In consideration of the coronavirus pandemic, there have been discussions about whether or not a sheriff can voluntarily decide to not comply with this General Statute and not execute the writ within 5 days as required by the statute.

While everyone recognizes the predicament likely faced by tenants being evicted during the coronavirus pandemic, the landlord has followed proper legal process and has obtained from the court a Writ for Possession of Property. Therefore, the law of North Carolina requires that the sheriff **shall** execute the writ "no more than five days from the sheriff's receipt thereof" (emphasis added).

The Sheriff's Legal Obligation

We are not aware of and have not found any legal authority in the General Statutes or in case law that authorizes the sheriff to fail to follow this statute, nor any legal authority in the General Statutes or in case law that authorizes the sheriff to fail to follow any other General Statute.

The Landlord's Option to Stop Execution of the Writ for Possession of Property

The person who does have the authority to stop the execution of the Writ for Possession of Property in a summary ejectment court case is the landlord. G.S. § 42-36.2(a)(2) provides that the sheriff shall remove the tenant's property within the 5 day time period <u>unless</u>: "the landlord, or his authorized agent, signs a statement saying that the landlord does not want to eject the tenant because the tenant has paid all court costs charged to him and has satisfied his indebtedness to the landlord."

Upon receipt of such a statement from the landlord, the sheriff <u>shall</u> return the writ unexecuted to the issuing clerk of court and shall make a notation on the writ of his reasons. The sheriff shall attach a copy of the landlord's statement to the writ. If the writ is returned unexecuted because the landlord signed such a statement, the clerk shall make an entry of satisfaction on the judgment docket.

The Governor's Executive Orders

We are not aware of and have not found any legal authority for the Governor to authorize or direct a sheriff to fail to follow this statute. No such authority is contained in the recent Governor's Executive Orders No. 117 and No. 118. Also, no such authority can be found in the General Statutes that authorize issuance of the Governor's Executive Orders.

The Order of the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of North Carolina

On March 19, 2020, the Chief Justice entered an Order that provides, in pertinent part:

Extension of Time and Periods of Limitation Pursuant to N.C.G.S. § 7A-39(b)(1)

I order that all pleadings, motions, notices, and other documents and papers that were or are due to be filed in any county of this state on or after 16 March 2020 and before the close of business on 17 April 2020 in civil actions, criminal actions, estates, and special proceedings shall be deemed to be timely filed if they are filed before the close of business on 17 April 2020.

I further order that all other acts that were or are due to be done in any county of this state on or after 16 March 2020 and before the close of business on 17 April 2020 in civil actions, criminal actions, estates, and special proceedings shall be deemed to be timely done if they are done before the close of business on 17 April 2020.

After much thoughtful analysis and discussion among Association attorneys and several sheriffs' office legal advisors, two different reasonable interpretations of the Chief Justice's Order have been identified. Since there is no legal process or mechanism for us to clarify the intent or determine the correct scope of the Chief Justice's Order, **both potential interpretations are attached at the end of this message**. Either of them, or neither of them, may ultimately be determined by our courts to be a correct interpretation of the Chief Justice's Order. We are sharing this email with the staff of Governor Cooper and Chief Justice Beasley so they are aware of the various interpretations.

Trial Court Judges

Although nothing has been documented in writing, some sheriffs have advised that they asked their local trial court judges if the judges could or would enter an Order authorizing

the sheriff to not comply with the requirement in G.S. § 42-36.2(a), regarding execution on a Writ for Possession of Property, that provides that the sheriff **shall** execute the writ "no more than five days from the sheriff's receipt thereof (emphasis added). Those sheriffs report that their judges advised that neither the judge nor the sheriff had any authority to authorize non-compliance with the mandatory provision of the statute.

Accountability of the Sheriff

- G.S. § 162-8 provides that a sheriff must furnish a bond. A claim could be filed against the sheriff's bond for the sheriff's failure to make "the due execution and return of process, the payment of fees and moneys collected, and the faithful execution of his office as sheriff."
- G.S. § 128-16 provides that the sheriff "shall be removed from office by the judge of the superior court, resident in or holding the courts of the district where said officer is resident upon charges made in writing, and hearing thereunder, for the following causes:
- (1) For willful or habitual neglect or refusal to perform the duties of his office.
- (2) For willful misconduct or maladministration in office."

An action to remove the sheriff "may be filed upon the relation of any five qualified electors of the county in which the person charged is an officer, upon the approval of the county attorney of such county, or the district attorney of the district, or by any such officer upon his own motion. It shall be the duty of the county attorney or district attorney to appear and prosecute this proceeding." G.S. § 128-17.

How an action under this statute might end up and how the Chief Justice's order could impact any such hearing is unknown at this point. Therefore, as is always the case where the actions of a sheriff could be viewed as failing to perform a duty mandated by our General Statutes, we recommend you consult with your own legal advisor or county attorney prior to making the decision to stop executing Writs for Possession of Property that have been ordered by the courts.

Alternative Interpretation A

It has been suggested that the part of the Chief Justice's Order, in the second paragraph, that provides that "all other acts....shall be deemed to be timely done if they are done before the close of business on 17 April 2020" should be interpreted to mean that sheriffs do not have to comply with the 5 day deadline clearly specified in G.S. § 42-36.2 for execution of a Writ for Possession of Property.

This order was issued pursuant to G.S. § 7A-39(b)(1), which states in pertinent part: "the Chief Justice may by order entered pursuant to this subsection extendthe time period or period of limitation within which pleadings, motions, notices, and other documents and papers may be timely filed and other acts may be timely done in civil actions, criminal actions, estates, and special proceedings...."

If G.S. § 7A-39(b)(1) could, by this Order, extend the time period for execution on all Writs for Possession of Property until April 17, 2020, then it must be concluded that this Order also extended the time period and deadlines until April 17, 2020 for the following additional mandatory actions:

- 1. --- Mandatory domestic violence arrests would be extended from being immediate until April 17, 2020. G.S. § 50B-4.1(b) --- A law enforcement officer shall arrest and take a person into custody, with or without a warrant or other process, if the officer has probable cause to believe that the person knowingly has violated a valid protective order excluding the person from the residence or household occupied by a victim of domestic violence or directing the person to refrain from doing any or all of the acts specified in G.S. § 50B-3(a)(9).
- 2. --- An arrested domestic violence defendant would be held in custody, instead of a maximum of 48 hours, until April 17, 2020. G.S. § 15A-534.1(b). A defendant may be retained in custody not more than 48 hours from the time of arrest without a determination being made under this section by a judge. If a judge has not acted pursuant to this section within 48 hours of arrest, the magistrate shall act under the provisions of this section.
- 3. --- Instead of being held within 96 hours of arrest, the first appearance for arrested defendants would be continued until April 17, 2020. G.S. § 15A-601(c). Unless the defendant is released pursuant to Article 26 of this Chapter, Bail, first appearance before a district court judge must be held within 96 hours after the defendant is taken into custody or at the first regular session of the district court in the county, whichever occurs first.
- 4. --- Instead of a law enforcement officer taking an arrested defendant for an Initial Appearance before a magistrate "without unnecessary delay," the officer would not have to take the defendant for an Initial Appearance until April 17, 2020. G.S. § 15A-511(a) (1). A law-enforcement officer making an arrest with or without a warrant must take the arrested person without unnecessary delay before a magistrate as provided in G.S. § 15A-501.
- 5. --- For Involuntary Commitment (IVC) respondents, instead of an officer taking the respondent for a First Examination "without unnecessary delay," the officer would have until April 17, 2020 to do so. G.S. § 122C-263(a). Without unnecessary delay after assuming custody, the law enforcement officer or the individual designated or required to provide transportation pursuant to G.S. § 122C-251(g) shall take the respondent to a facility or other location identified by the LME/MCO in the community crisis services plan adopted pursuant to G.S. § 122C-202.2 that has an available commitment examiner and is capable of performing a first examination in conjunction with a health screening at the same location, unless circumstances indicate the respondent appears to be suffering a medical emergency in which case the law enforcement officer will seek immediate medical assistance for the respondent.
- 6. --- For Involuntary Commitment (IVC) respondents, instead of the respondent getting a physician's examination within 24 hours of arrival at a 24-hour facility, the examination would be delayed until April 17, 2020. G.S. § 122C-266(a). Except as provided in subsections (b) and (e), within 24 hours of arrival at a 24-hour facility described in G.S. § 122C-252, the respondent shall be examined by a physician.

There are numerous other General Statutes with similar deadlines. It seems unlikely that

the Chief Justice's Order would be intended to or be found to extend all of the above deadlines and all other deadlines in the General Statutes to April 17, 2020. And, if the Chief Justice's Order was intended to do so, undoubtedly the Order could have precisely said so and left nothing to interpretation or speculation.

Alternative Interpretation B

Authority of the Chief Justice

The General Assembly, in G.S. § 42-36.2, has set the deadline by which the sheriff shall execute on a valid Writ for Possession of Property as five (5) days. While the Chief Justice has no direct authority to overrule the General Assembly as to a matter of statutory law, it is also possible to interpret that the General Assembly has delegated, in times of emergency, authority to the Chief Justice under G.S. § 7A-39(b)(1) to issue orders, such as the Order issued on March 19, to suspend compliance with deadlines imposed by the statutes as to processes which fall under the authority of the Courts.

Effect of the Order

The Order only has to do with timing. It does not otherwise relieve a sheriff from any of his/her duties and responsibilities, nor does it abrogate the sheriff's responsibilities upon expiration of the Order's covered time. The Chief Justice's Order very-nearly mirrors the language as to what is allowed under Her Honor's statutory authority in G.S. § 7A-39(b)(1). Her Honor's Order indicates that it intends to cover all "acts that were or are due to be done." In essence, one interpretation is that the Order is setting a new due date for legal acts required under law.

<u>Does the Order apply to the execution of a Writ for Possession of Property?</u> Breaking down the language, it certainly may. Here's why:

- A. The summary ejectment process contained in G.S. § 42 is very clearly a "civil action."
- B. The next question is whether the execution by the sheriff of a Writ for Possession of Property is incorporated within the "other acts" referenced in the Chief Justice's Order. The phrase "other acts" does not appear to be a term of art, as it is not defined in Chapter 7A (which outlines the role of the Judicial Branch), it appears nowhere in the NC Rules of Civil Procedure, nor is it defined in the Criminal Procedure Act. Based on this, we must give those words the best interpretation possible based on their plain meaning. Based on the plain meaning of the term "other acts," in the context of the judicial function, it is reasonable to interpret that one such "act" would be the sheriff's execution of a Writ for Possession of Property as required under G.S. § 42-36.2.

Sheriff as an Officer of the Courts

How does this apply to sheriffs? Under G.S. § 162-14, the sheriff has a duty to execute civil processes and "make due return" of those processes. When the sheriff serves a Writ for Possession of Property, he/she is acting as an officer of the court in advancing the interests of a civil plaintiff in possession of real property. This duty is one which the sheriff alone can perform and the Chief Justice's Order in no way alleviates the sheriff from his/her

obligation to perform that duty. Instead, the Order can be interpreted to allow the sheriff additional time in which to have performed that duty in a timely fashion. So, rather than five (5) days, the sheriff would have until April 17 to execute on the writ of possession and still be within the time allowed by G.S. § 42-36.2 to have validly executed the writ of possession.

The Chief Justice's Order is not a mandate

The Chief Justice's Order can be interpreted as to allow the sheriff <u>discretion</u> as to when "due to be done" may occur... which, in this case, is no later than April 17. <u>This interpretation does not mean that Writs for Possession of Property received between now and April 17 are invalid in any way</u>. Nothing in the Chief Justice's Order would seem to prevent a sheriff from doing "business as usual." If a writ is received that otherwise appears to be valid for service, it can certainly be served, as normal, within the guidelines of the statutes. What the Order may apparently give to sheriffs is the ability to use some discretion in deciding, on a case-by-case basis, whether or not the writs should be served on the normal schedule, or perhaps delayed for service until closer to April 17 based on the health crisis we are facing statewide. At this point, without any further Orders from the Chief Justice, it appears that April 17 is a <u>hard deadline</u>. This may mean that if a sheriff were to delay service based on this Order, Writs for Possession of Property may need to begin being served in advance of the April 17 deadline to avoid having to serve a great number on one day.

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Good Morning Joe and Erika –

We are a bit perplexed by this email, suggesting an information call for Back@Home. Our confusion of course is due in part to the fact that our CoC (as well as many others) have been requesting information regarding the implementation of this statewide program, and to date that information has not yet been provided – yet you are now proposing a statewide wide Back@Home information call, appearing to bypass individual CoC leadership and or involvement.

When the CoCs were first informed of this proposal on May 27, we believed this was a proposal and that the feedback and comments due on June 1st would be taken into account. Our CoC met that deadline, providing comment and request for additional information. During the June 3rd NCCEH call, we and several other CoCs expressed concern and posed multiple questions, resulting in a request for a special call to provide clarity and response to the questions being presented by our CoC and others. The request for a special meeting occurred on June 8^{th.}

It wasn't until June 8th that we understood that this was not a proposal but rather <u>the</u> state plan. The June 8th call became another presentation on Back@Home, similar to the one on May 27th, along with a brief tutorial on collective impact. We were informed that CoCs had to "opt out" of the statewide plan – slide 10 of that presentation delineated how that was to occur. Again, questions and concerns were raised, along with a promise from the presenters that CoC questions would be answered and concerns addressed. That same promise occurred on the June 10th NCCEH call – announcing that the NC ESG-CV Fair Share Allocation notice would come out Friday and that an FAQ would be provided Monday, with the NC ESG-CV RFA to follow shortly thereafter. We did confirm that you all had the collective CoC list of the not yet answered questions and concerns.

While the Fair Share was released on June 15th, to date, the questions and concerns raised by our CoC have not yet been addressed. We have adhered to your deadlines, provided feedback, participated in calls / mtgs that we were made aware, yet we cannot get the questions answered and concerns addressed that we feel will help our CoC make informed and intentional decisions regarding the use of COVID Cares Act dollars in our community. Certainly we cannot make a decision regarding opting in or out of a plan that we cannot get the necessary information.

We would very much like to move this along and off our plate as the pandemic dictates our attention be focused on immediate direct service needs. We are however aware that millions of dollars are at stake for our CoC as well as others – dollars we cannot afford to lose. Therefore, is it possible that you can provide us with the name or names of someone who can help assist us with gathering this information – as soon as possible?




RALEIGH — Today, the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services (NCDHHS) announced that the state's Community Action Agencies (CAAs) have begun to receive flexible funds that can be used to help low-income individuals and families meet a variety of needs caused by the economic disruption of the COVID-19 pandemic. These funds are part of the federal Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) and can, among other allowable uses, help eligible residents facing eviction with unmet rent and utility expenses.

"With the economic disruption caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, the Governor's moratorium on evictions and utility shutoffs is the only thing keeping many families in safe and stable housing," said NCDHHS Secretary Mandy Cohen, M.D. "This flexible funding will allow our Community Action Agencies to continue to meet a wide array of needs in our communities, including helping families remain in their homes when the moratorium is lifted."

Community Action Agencies are nonprofit organizations created by President Lyndon B. Johnson's signing of the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964. To be eligible for CSBG-funded services, individuals and families must be at or below 200% of the federal poverty level.

"Community Action Agencies have helped bridge gaps for low wealth residents and communities for 55 years," said Sharon Goodson, Executive Director of the NC Community Action Association. "They provide comprehensive services like case management, transportation, housing, employment, education, child care, eviction and emergency assistance programs to ensure low wealth residents increase and maintain their economic stability."

The Interagency Council for Coordinating Homelessness Programs created a COVID Workgroup, which prepared a strategic plan and funding proposals for crisis response and housing stability. The Plan has three main components:

- 1. Maintaining safe sheltering and street outreach programs;
- 2. Operationalizing non-congregate sheltering; and
- 3. Housing Stability Response

- 1. Back@Home Rehousing and
- 2. Safe@Home Eviction Prevention programs.

The ICCHP is currently working with the Office of State Budget, the Governor's Policy Office, DHHS—ESG Office, and the Department of Commerce to identify how CARES Act HUD funding could be used for these identified needs. ESG funding can definitely be used to meet the first component (shelters and street outreach). It seems likely that ESG funds can be used for Back@Home Rehousing, but there is work to explore any barriers to using these funds for this purpose. DHHS is working with the NC Coalition to End Homelessness and HUD Technical Assistance on this. Once this is resolved, we think we can start the program within 4-6 weeks.

At this point, there is not funding identified that can be used for the Safe@Home Eviction Prevention program. These are eligible expenses under CSBG-CV, but there is currently a requirement that CDBG goes directly to local jurisdictions and cannot be used for a state-administered program and granted directly to non-profits. The ICCHP is working with the Department of Commerce on exploring if there is a waiver that could be submitted to allow funds to be used to support the Safe@Home Eviction Prevention Program. There is precedent for this, as CDBG-DR can be granted directly from the state to non-profits, so we think it is possible that HUD would allow this waiver.

Happy to share any additional detail about the ICCHP workgroup proposal.



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

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Great! One thing I've been hearing from emergency shelters (particularly in small/rural communities) is a "shelter-in-place" policy, which essentially means not letting clients leave the shelter. I wonder if this might fit into the conversation around accepting new clients, and what the answer to those policies might be? Is there a unified message or technical assistance needed to continue pushing a client-centered, housing first approach?

My only other thought, and this may just be a question without an immediate answer, but especially with eviction diversion and the mechanisms of financial assistance, how can we maintain a racial equity lens when moving this work forward? Just thinking that communities of Color are seeing disproportionate rates of infection, and are more likely to be in "essential" jobs. This may result in a surge of housing crises that affects Black and POC communities disproportionately. I wonder if that is something this group can think about proactively?

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Hi Erika,

My apologies for taking so long to provide you with some more information on the Targeting Program. Below is an overview of the Targeting Program:

Basics: All 9% & 4% LIHTC must set aside 10% of their units for the Targeting Program. Sometimes properties set-aside up to 20% of units. Every year approx. 600-800 Targeted Units become available through the LIHTC projects. TU are in roughly 80 counties in NC.

Population: Targeted Units are set-aside for persons with disabilities. The Referral Agency that is working with the household, submits an application for TU to DHHS Regional Housing Coordinators and has verified some type of disability income.

Affordability: Targeted Units vary in affordability. Most TU are set at 50%-60% of Area Median Income (AMI), but some can be as low as 30% AMI. The reason for a lower affordability on some TU are due to different funding sources the project may have (i.e. HOME, National Housing Trust Fund, etc..).

Example of Affordability at 50% or 60% AMI: In Raleigh/Wake County a 1 bedroom is approx. \$1500/mo, so at 50% AMI rent would be \$750/mo and at 60% AMI, rent would be \$900. This is not going to be affordable on its own for most low-income people. Thus, a rental subsidy is needed to help the household afford the rent.

Key Rental Assistance: Since approx. 2006 the General Assembly has provided recurring appropriations for Key Rental Assistance to layer on top of Targeted Units to make them affordable. Key has a payment standard for a 1-bedroom of \$520. The Key payment standard increases as the size of apartments increase. The current annual G.A. for Key appropriations is \$5.255 million. There are currently between 2300 - 2400 households on Key and it's oversubscribed. Unless there is an increase in the G.A. appropriations, the state is unable to offer Key to new households.

Utilization Rate: Currently TU are at a 45% utilization rate across the state. When there are no referrals from DHHS, then the property is able to offer those units to the general public.

What's the benefit of Targeted Units? DHHS has first right of refusal for those set-aside Targeted Units. Many properties have waitlists, so having those set-aside units provides access to DHHS first. TU are at a lower affordability rate. Properties agree to accept Key or any other type of rental subsidy that a Targeted tenant brings.

'It's a Time Bomb': 23 Die as Virus Hits Packed Homeless Shelters

The virus is spreading where social distancing is nearly impossible. But there's no staying at home when you do not have one.

Roy Coleman, a 69-year-old living in a homeless shelter on Wards Island, was taken away by ambulance after showing symptoms of Covid-19. The other shelter residents were relieved — until Mr. Coleman was allowed to return last week after testing positive at Harlem Hospital.

At another shelter, Alphonso Syville, 45, said that as much as he tried, he could not block out the incessant coughing that he heard from a man a few feet away.

At Delta Manor, a shelter in the Bronx, Christian Cascone recalled how a roommate confronted another resident who had poor hygiene and would not wash his hands. The resident "said something like, 'Well, if God chooses for me to die, I'll die,'" said Mr. Cascone, 37.

"My roommate said, 'Well, the good Lord also wants the rest of us to be healthy, too," he said.

While much of New York City is staying inside, a crisis has taken hold among a population for whom social distancing is nearly impossible: the more than 17,000 men and women, many of them already in poor health, who sleep in roughly 100 group or "congregate" shelters for single adults. Most live in dormitories that are fertile fields for the virus, with beds close enough for people sleeping in them to hold hands.

And rather than keeping people away from shelters, the virus has driven them in.

Some inmates released from Rikers Island to control the outbreak in the jail have wound up in shelters. And with the outdoor safety net falling apart — few pedestrians to beg for change; public bathrooms shut; many soup kitchens closed for lack of food and volunteers — the nightly shelter population has consistently reached levels seen only a few times in the last decade, and usually only on the most frigid nights of winter.

"When all of those systems simultaneously break down, you're going to get this influx into congregate situations," said Joshua Goldfein, a staff attorney at the Legal Aid Society. "It's a time bomb."

Officially as of Sunday, 23 shelter residents have died in hospitals, among them 14 men and two women from assessment centers and shelters for single adults where multiple, unrelated people share rooms, according to the Department of Homeless Services.

And 371 people from shelters had tested positive for the virus, about 80 percent of them from the single-adult facilities, though those adults represent less than a quarter of the homeless population. The rest are mostly families who often stay in studio-like units by themselves.

While total prevention is impossible, the city has been scrambling to at least lower the risk.

Paying an average cost of at least \$174 a night, it has been renting hotel rooms, empty for lack of tourists, to isolate shelter residents who have symptoms or tested positive as well those potentially exposed. On Saturday, Mayor Bill de Blasio announced that 2,500 more shelter residents would be moved to hotels by the end of April, in addition to 3,500 who were already sharing rooms in hotels before the virus hit because there was no room in traditional shelters.

Residents who are at least 70 years old, and some residents in the 10 most densely packed shelters, are also being moved to hotels, whether they have symptoms or not. Some homeless families previously staying in hotels are being moved to make room for those residents.

Steven Banks, the commissioner of social services, said the city also has purchased 24 hand-washing stations and 36 portable toilets to be installed in 12 street locations, for those homeless people who refuse to go to shelters.

Shelters are staggering meal times, and temporarily dropping rules that require residents to leave dorms during cleaning, to reduce the chance the residents will go out and then return after having been exposed.

Simply closing the shelters to stop the spread, as if they were dining halls or Broadway theaters, is not an option.

"We're still open and offering services," Mr. Banks said. "Others have shut their doors."

The number of New York shelter infections does not capture the scope of the peril; they reflect mainly people who had been so ill that they had to be taken to city hospitals to be tested and treated. The figures do not include people staying in shelters run by charities or other public agencies.

Other cities with significant homeless populations have begun to see similar problems. San Francisco tested everyone inside its largest shelter last week, and so far 81 residents and 10 workers have been confirmed as infected. The city has lifted its ban on tent encampments as long as the tents are at least six feet apart.

Even before the pandemic hit, homelessness was an intractable problem for Mayor Bill de Blasio. He took office in 2014 vowing to reduce the number of homeless, but it has only grown, to an estimated 79,000 people, in part because of rising rents beyond the reach of low-income families.

Since 2014, the budget for homeless services has doubled to about \$3.2 billion, according to the city comptroller's office.

The shelter system is a patchwork of 450 buildings, including studios for families with children, hotel rooms with double beds, privately owned but decrepit apartments and cavernous spaces with rows of beds, like the mammoth Bedford-Atlantic Armory shelter in Brooklyn.

The decentralized nature of the system, and the transience of its clients, have made the application of new policies somewhat ragged.

Some residents in shelters and peace officers working in them say some of the preventive measures have not been put into practice or are being ignored by residents.

"If this is a worldwide epidemic, we should have a fair chance to protect ourselves," said Roberto Mangual, 27, who stays at the Clarke Thomas shelter on Wards Island, where Mr. Coleman was allowed to return. "We don't really have that chance in a men's shelter, to be honest."

Mr. Coleman said that after he spent a night back at Clarke Thomas, the staff gave him a MetroCard to travel to one of the quarantine hotels in Long Island City, Queens.

After an inquiry by The New York Times, the homeless services department sent a message to shelter providers reminding them that anyone returning from a hospital with symptoms of Covid-19 should be put in isolation and not placed on public transportation.

In a phone interview from the hotel on Saturday, Mr. Coleman said he believed he had contracted the virus at the shelter. "I was around a lot of people coughing, throwing up, sneezing," he said.

He said that he was happy to now be in a room by himself, where he said he was getting round-the-clock medical attention. "If I need medication, I call them and they send up some aspirin," he said. On Sunday he was moved to another hotel specifically for seniors.

Stephen Mott, chief of staff for HELP USA, which operates Clarke Thomas, said the shelter has been under a great deal of strain but acknowledged that it needed to do better. "We're up against something huge," he said. "Things that we used to let slide we can't let slide anymore."

At the city-run Catherine Street Shelter in Lower Manhattan, where 100 women live, many residents are not taking precautions, like washing their hands and staying six feet apart, one woman who lives there said. They brush against each other when walking in a narrow stairwell.

The staff changed the configuration of the cafeteria so that there were only two chairs per table, but some residents simply moved chairs so they could sit together, said the woman, who did not want to be identified because she feared retaliation from staff in the shelter.

Derek Jackson, director of the law enforcement division in Teamsters Local 237, a city employee union, said about 550 peace officers work in the shelter system, and as of early last week, 26 had tested positive. Another 41 shelter workers also had tested positive as of last week, according to the

citv.

"We're not sure they are being transparent with how many clients are sick with this disease," Mr. Jackson said of the city homeless agency. "We don't know who is putting us at risk at the shelters."

Mr. Jackson said the city was slow to provide masks, gloves and other personal protection equipment to the officers.

The homeless services agency has been dealing with the same supply shortages as everyone else, said Mr. Banks, the commissioner. Last week, after finding masks to purchase, the agency began distributing 100,000 masks to shelters for employees, including peace officers, and now has an additional shipment of 500,000 masks, along with sanitizer and gloves to give to peace officers. Mr. Banks also tapped into Robin Hood, the philanthropic foundation, to donate masks for shelter residents and people living on the street.

But the inability of shelter residents to self-quarantine is still taking a toll. There is no staying at home when you do not have one.

At Opportunity House, a charity-run shelter in Brooklyn, many residents are older and have serious health issues, including problems with vision, said David Gaynor, 60, who is staying there. "Some of the literature, you have to be an ant to read it," he said.

Camba, which operates Opportunity House, said it is has been taking measures to keep residents safe. "We understand the anxiety that everyone is experiencing," the nonprofit said in a statement.

Mr. Gaynor, who was interviewed while wearing a green bandanna around his neck that he could pull over his mouth, recalled one resident who did not speak English well and had trouble explaining his symptoms.

The staff finally took action when they saw him bowled over and heard the man say the words he knew in English. "Am-bu-lance. Hos-pi-tal," Mr. Gaynor said, enunciating each word.

"Everybody understands sick," he said.

. Frequently Asked Questions and Advice

Updated April 11, 2020

• When will this end?

This is a difficult question, because a lot depends on how well the virus is contained. A better question might be: "How will we know when to reopen the country?" In an American Enterprise Institute report, Scott Gottlieb, Caitlin Rivers, Mark B. McClellan, Lauren Silvis and Crystal Watson staked out four goal posts for recovery: Hospitals in the state must be able to safely treat all patients requiring hospitalization, without resorting to crisis standards of care; the state needs to be able to at least test everyone who has symptoms; the state is able to conduct monitoring of confirmed cases and contacts; and there must be a sustained reduction in cases for at least 14 days.

o How can I help?

Charity Navigator, which evaluates charities using a numbers-based system, has a running list of nonprofits working in communities affected by the outbreak. You can give blood through the American Red Cross, and World Central Kitchen has stepped in to distribute meals in major cities. More than 30,000 coronavirus-related GoFundMe fund-raisers have started in the past few weeks. (The sheer number of fund-raisers means more of them are likely to fail to meet their goal, though.)

o What should I do if I feel sick?

If you've been exposed to the coronavirus or think you have, and have a fever or symptoms like a cough or difficulty breathing, call a doctor. They should give you advice on whether you should be tested, how to get tested, and how to seek medical treatment without potentially infecting or exposing others.

o Should I wear a mask?

The C.D.C. has recommended that all Americans wear cloth masks if they go out in public. This is a shift in federal guidance reflecting new concerns that the coronavirus is being spread by infected people who have no symptoms. Until now, the C.D.C., like the W.H.O., has advised that ordinary people don't need to wear masks unless they are sick and coughing. Part of the reason was to preserve medical-grade masks for health care workers who desperately need them at a time when they are in continuously short supply. Masks don't replace hand washing and social distancing.

o How do I get tested?

If you're sick and you think you've been exposed to the new coronavirus, the C.D.C. recommends that you call your healthcare provider and explain your symptoms and fears. They will decide if you need to be tested. Keep in mind that there's a chance —

because of a lack of testing kits or because you're asymptomatic, for instance — you won't be able to get tested.

o How does coronavirus spread?

It seems to spread <u>very easily from person to person</u>, especially in homes, hospitals and other confined spaces. The pathogen can be carried on tiny respiratory droplets that fall as they are coughed or sneezed out. It may also be transmitted when we touch a contaminated surface and then touch our face.

o Is there a vaccine vet?

No. Clinical trials are underway in the United States, China and Europe. But American officials and pharmaceutical executives have said that a vaccine remains at least 12 to 18 months away.

o What makes this outbreak so different?

Unlike the flu, there is no known treatment or vaccine, and <u>little is known about this particular virus so far</u>. It seems to be more lethal than the flu, but the numbers are still uncertain. And it hits the elderly and those with underlying conditions — not just those with respiratory diseases — particularly hard.

• What if somebody in my family gets sick?

If the family member doesn't need hospitalization and can be cared for at home, you should help him or her with basic needs and monitor the symptoms, while also keeping as much distance as possible, according to guidelines issued by the C.D.C. If there's space, the sick family member should stay in a separate room and use a separate bathroom. If masks are available, both the sick person and the caregiver should wear them when the caregiver enters the room. Make sure not to share any dishes or other household items and to regularly clean surfaces like counters, doorknobs, toilets and tables. Don't forget to wash your hands frequently.

o Should I stock up on groceries?

Plan two weeks of meals if possible. But people should not hoard food or supplies. Despite the empty shelves, the supply chain remains strong. And remember to wipe the handle of the grocery cart with a disinfecting wipe and wash your hands as soon as you get home.

o Can I go to the park?

Yes, but make sure you keep six feet of distance between you and people who don't live in your home. Even if you just hang out in a park, rather than go for a jog or a walk, getting some fresh air, and hopefully sunshine, is a good idea.

Should I pull my money from the markets?

That's not a good idea. Even if you're retired, having a balanced portfolio of stocks and bonds so that your money keeps up with inflation, or even grows, makes sense. But retirees may want to think about having enough cash set aside for a year's worth of living expenses and big payments needed over the next five years.

• What should I do with my 401(k)?

Watching your balance go up and down can be scary. <u>You may be wondering if you should decrease your contributions</u> <u>don't!</u> If your employer matches any part of your contributions, make sure you're at least saving as much as you can to get that "free money."

See attached guidance from HUD that we have shared with Shelters.

As far as the use of HUD ESG funds for COVID-19 click **Eligible ESG Costs for Infectious Disease Preparedness** .

To receive reimbursement for the use of ESG funds for this purpose the sub-recipient would simply send us a letter or email making the request. We would approve or disapprove or require additional information. They make their purchase and on the next reimbursement request they would note it on their workbook like any other expense and include the receipt. This information is filed with the permanent record. When HUD comes to audit would be treated like any other expense with documented support that the request was received, approved, paid and reimbursed.

Please see attached. HUD has a Minimum Habitability Standard for shelters. We complete this form as a part of our on-site monitoring. Any infraction would need to be corrected as a part of a corrective action plan and if serious could be taken up with local authorities. (This has never happened.) For the large part shelters **ARE NOT** regulated in this state. If the shelter is in an area that is not zoned for residential then the owner must have the zoning changed locally. This is usually done pre-occupation. Local officials such as fire, public health etc. do not have to approve occupation and do not enter unless invited or if they receive a compliant. In fact shelters are unregulated and do not need a license to operate. It should also be noted that we do not fund shelter renovations which is the states choice and allowed. This practice is a long-standing one going back to the beginning of the program. The thought was it was better to fund the operation than to use the funds on the building. We occasionally allow funds to be used for appliances under \$500.00.

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Good Morning Joe and Erika -

We are a bit perplexed by this email, suggesting an information call for Back@Home. Our confusion of course is due in part to the fact that our CoC (as well as many others) have been requesting information regarding the implementation of this statewide program, and to date that information has not yet been provided – yet you are now proposing a statewide wide Back@Home information call, appearing to bypass individual CoC leadership and or involvement.

When the CoCs were first informed of this proposal on May 27, we believed this was a proposal and that the feedback and comments due on June 1st would be taken into account. Our CoC met that deadline, providing comment and request for additional information. During the June 3rd NCCEH call, we and several other CoCs expressed concern and posed multiple questions, resulting in a request for a special call to provide clarity and response to the questions being presented by our CoC and others. The request for a special meeting occurred on June 8^{th.}

It wasn't until June 8th that we understood that this was not a proposal but rather <u>the</u> state plan. The June 8th call became another presentation on Back@Home, similar to the one on May 27th, along with a brief tutorial on collective impact. We were informed that CoCs had to "opt out" of the statewide plan – slide 10 of that presentation delineated how that was to occur. Again, questions and concerns were raised, along with a promise from the presenters that CoC questions would be answered and concerns addressed. That same promise occurred on the June 10th NCCEH call – announcing that the NC ESG-CV Fair Share Allocation notice would come out Friday and that an FAQ would be provided Monday, with the NC ESG-CV RFA to follow shortly thereafter. We did confirm that you all had the collective CoC list of the not yet answered questions and concerns.

While the Fair Share was released on June 15th, to date, the questions and concerns raised by our CoC have not yet been addressed. We have adhered to your deadlines, provided feedback, participated in calls / mtgs that we were made aware, yet we cannot get the questions answered and concerns addressed that we feel will help our CoC make informed and intentional decisions regarding the use of COVID Cares Act dollars in our community. Certainly we cannot make a decision regarding opting in or out of a plan that we cannot get the necessary information.

We would very much like to move this along and off our plate as the pandemic dictates our attention be focused on immediate direct service needs. We are however aware that millions of dollars are at stake for our CoC as well as others – dollars we cannot afford to lose. Therefore, is it possible that you can provide us with the name or names of someone who can help assist us with gathering this information – as soon as possible?

Hello,

There are two barriers to CDBG-CV. The first barrier is removed by the way the second allocation is provided to the state. The second, to our understanding, still exists and will require a waiver from HUD. The two barriers are described below.

- 1. Ability to spend CDBG-CV funds in any city/county in the state.
 - a. In the first allocation, CDBG-CV awarded to the state can only delivered to non-entitlement communities. Operating a statewide eviction prevention program is difficult when money spent can't be used in many communities in the state.
 - b. The second allocation provides all funding to the state, so removes the issue of only being able to fund projects/communities in certain areas of the state.
- 2. Ability for the state to contract with non-profits directly and administer a state operated program.
 - a. From our understanding, this issue is not resolved in the second allocation. The rules seem to still read that all funding needs to be sent to local jurisdictions to then grant out to non-profits.
 - b. We were planning to work with Commerce to submit a waiver to HUD that would change this.
 - i. There is precedent with CDBG-DR, which allows states to run state operated programs and grant funds directly to non-profits (in addition to granting funds to local jurisdictions).
 - ii. It would overall allow for the additional structure and operational efficiency that a statewide approach brings in disaster response. For example:
 - 1. Many non-profits work in multiple jurisdictions. It would relieve administrative burden on these agencies to receive funding directly from the state.
 - 2. There could be one streamlined system that, while run administered by local organizations at the regional level, could be coordinated by the state to allow us to better manage a large disaster response that would meet a need (eviction prevention) that is happening across all counties and

jurisdictions.

Happy for Jason or Kristen to jump in if they have any different understanding of the CDBG-CV barriers.

The Interagency Council for Coordinating Homelessness Programs created a COVID Workgroup, which prepared a strategic plan and funding proposals for crisis response and housing stability. The Plan has three main components:

- 1. Maintaining safe sheltering and street outreach programs;
- 2. Operationalizing non-congregate sheltering; and
- 3. Housing Stability Response
 - 1. Back@Home Rehousing and
 - 2. Safe@Home Eviction Prevention programs.

The ICCHP is currently working with the Office of State Budget, the Governor's Policy Office, DHHS—ESG Office, and the Department of Commerce to identify how CARES Act HUD funding could be used for these identified needs. ESG funding can definitely be used to meet the first component (shelters and street outreach). It seems likely that ESG funds can be used for Back@Home Rehousing, but there is work to explore any barriers to using these funds for this purpose. DHHS is working with the NC Coalition to End Homelessness and HUD Technical Assistance on this. Once this is resolved, we think we can start the program within 4-6 weeks.

At this point, there is not funding identified that can be used for the Safe@Home Eviction Prevention program. These are eligible expenses under CSBG-CV, but there is currently a requirement that CDBG goes directly to local jurisdictions and cannot be used for a state-administered program and granted directly to non-profits. The ICCHP is working with the Department of Commerce on exploring if there is a waiver that could be submitted to allow funds to be used to support the Safe@Home Eviction Prevention Program. There is precedent for this, as CDBG-DR can be granted directly from the state to non-profits, so we think it is possible that HUD would allow this waiver.

Thanks for thinking of North Carolina. Here are a few lines on the program. Let me know if you need anything else.

The North Carolina non-congregate sheltering program is a collaborative effort between the State, counties and local partners to secure hotel and motel rooms, as well as essential wrap around services, for individuals with no other safe place to quarantine, isolate or social distance due to COVID-19. North Carolina received approval from the Federal Emergency Management Agency on April 6, 2020, and counties and local partners have since secured over 3,800 hotel and motel rooms available for health care workers, farm workers, individuals experiencing homelessness and other individuals and families exposed or at high-risk for severe disease and need a safe place to stay to prevent the spread of COVID-19. As of May 28, the program served over 2,100 people.

If information about reimbursement is helpful: FEMA will pay 75 percent of the costs associated with operating the non-congregate sheltering program and North Carolina will pay the remaining 25 percent.
